From the Archives of Scioto Lodge #6 F. & A. M.

By Laws of Scioto Lodge #2 F. & A.M.—1805

At a meeting of a Majority of the Brethren of Scioto Lodge #2 F. & A.M. under the jurisdiction of the State of Massachusetts at the house of Thomas Needham in Chillicothe November 22, 1805 the following Brethren were elected Thomas Gibson, W.M., Jervis Cutter, S.W., Nathaniel Willis, J.W. Adjourn to Wednesday, the 4th of December 1805...(Attest) Joseph Dix, Secretary Pro Tem

34th By-Law: That any Candidate Entered, Passed and Raised in the Lodge pay twenty dollars to the Lodge and one dollar to the Tyler to wit Ten Dollars on entering, five dollars on being passed and five dollars on being Raised. The Tyler's fee to be paid on entering, the money to be paid before admitting into the Lodge and at the time of presenting their Petitions.

35th By-Law: That any Brother being in arrears to the lodge on either the Festivals of St. John the Baptist or St. John the Evangelist when the sun is at high meridian, shall be suspended from his seat and functions until such time arrearages shall have been fully paid. That the name of such Brothers in default shall be handed to the Tyler by the Secretary intoning to remind him more particularly of his duty lest they might enter in an unwary moment when the Lodge is engaged in more important business. It is understood that our Brethren belonging to this Lodge living at a distance out of the length of their cable tow are not to be fined for not attending at our Regular Lodge night but at the Festival of St. John the Evangelist and St. John the Baptist although specified in Section 5.

Thy Rod and Staff...analogy of the 23rd Psalm from articles by Tim Finlay and Jim Herst

David says, "When I walk through the valley of deep darkness, I will not be afraid." What kind of courage does a sheep need? A sheep does not need courage to fight its enemies. The most courageous sheep would be an easy victim to the smallest wolf. A sheep needs courage to trust the shepherd.

David says, "Your rod and your staff, they comfort me." The rod was a small club, usually about 2 feet long, with stones embedded in the wood. The skillful shepherd could use it like a missile or as a weapon to beat off a predator. The staff was the long stick with the crook at the top. The staff was used to keep the sheep in line, or to rescue a sheep that had stumbled into a ravine. Both the rod and the staff were emblems of the shepherd's power. Undoubtedly they made enemies afraid. We can have comfort in dangerous situations when we realize that God's power is at our disposal. We often think of God's power with awe, but not necessarily with comfort.

What does the rod and staff means in Psalm 23?

The use of the words **Rod** and **Staff** are examples of Jewish poetry, the rhyming of ideas, and they mean the same thing just said differently. Psalms 23 is the Shepherd psalm, so the Rod and Staff mentioned here is the main tool of the shepherd. The shepherd had a long wooden pole, often called a **staff**, with one end bent into large hook. The long straight end or **rod** was used to defend the sheep from predators and to discipline wayward sheep. The hook end was used to rescue sheep from where ever they had fallen and to pull them to safety. "Thy rod and Thy staff, they comfort me." It was a comfort to David that the Lord used His "tools" as the Good Shepherd to defend, discipline and rescue us as His sheep.

..."thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." The rod is used for protection or defense and the staff is for guidance, for steadiness. If we have God's rod and staff, then it follows that we would be able to use those items. How? We seek God first. He provides protection, peace, rest. He has been saying this throughout the Psalm. He has not let us down, has not run away from us. He's helping us THROUGH the situation, the shadow of death. Or you could say that He is giving us the Light to go through the situation. What an AWESOME God He is!! What a wonderful Jesus, Who is the Shepherd that leads us.

"Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." The phrase "shadow of death," which can also be translated "deep darkness," is used figuratively of extreme danger. The right path may lead through ravines and river valleys where steep slopes block out the sun; the presence of the shepherd, however, calms the sheep. Similarly, we may go through great trials in life, but God is always there to help us.
