Amadeus Mozart	1	<p><i>"Neither a lofty degree of intelligence nor imagination nor both together go to the making of genius. Love, love, love, that is the soul of genius."</i> – Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart</p> <p>Freemasonry is composed of men from all walks of life. For centuries the fraternity has boasted pioneering scientists, courageous leaders, and revolutionary artists. Among them is a man whose musical compositions we regularly hear, whether in movies, TV, radio, or in our own free time: Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart.</p>

February Calendar	3	<p>This man created an unparalleled legacy. He single-handedly altered the course of Western music, creating over 600 compositions in his short life. While he was only 35 when he passed away, he spent his last years engaged with Freemasonry, fascinated by its lessons, history, and symbolism. So enraptured was he that he began weaving Masonic themes into his works, pieces that still enchant today.</p>
Installation of Officers Scioto Lodge #6	4	<p>Masonic Inspiration</p> <p>While living in Vienna, Mozart was initiated into Austrian Freemasonry on December 14th, 1784 to Lodge 'Zur Wohltätigkeit' at the age of 28. Little is known regarding what brought Mozart to Masonry, but it is clear he was passionate about the fraternity. The year before, Pope Clement XII issued a decree that prevented Catholics from pursuing membership in Freemasonry.</p>
Christmas Nativity Scene	4	<p>Mozart clearly saw no conflict, becoming a Master Mason and remaining active in the Craft until he passed away in 1791. The effect Freemasonry had on his life must have been profound. Not only is there evidence that he attended Lodge regularly, but Masonic influences began cropping up in his work.</p>
Chillicothe Chapter #4 Grand Officers	5	<p>In the seven years he was active in the fraternity, Amadeus wrote at least eight compositions specially for the Masons, including his Freemason's Funeral Music. There are also notable Masonic themes and symbolism residing in his famous opera "The Magic Flute." The overture sheet music shows a dotted figure that Mozart used to represent the three knocks a Brother would make to initiate a Masonic ceremony. Mozart began his opera the same way he would a Master Mason ceremony – with a musical "three knocks." Mozart's compositions intended for use by his Brethren include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Song: O heiliges Band der Freundschaft treuer Brüder" (O sacred bond of friendship between true brothers)• Cantata: "Dir, Seele des Weltalls"• Song: "Lied zur Gesellenreise: Die ihr einem neuen Grad" (For use at installation of new journeymen)• Cantata for tenor, male chorus, and orchestra: Die Maurerfreude (The Mason's Joy)• The Masonic Funeral Music• Two songs for the opening and closing ceremonies of the lodge:• Zur Eröffnung der Freimaurerloge: "Zerfließet Heut, Geliebter Brüder"• Zum Schluß der Freimaurerloge: "Ihr Unsre Neuen Leiter"• The Little German Cantata: Die ihr die unermesslichen Weltalls Schöpfer ehrt, for tenor and piano, for use at meetings of the "Colony of the Friends of Nature"• The Little Masonic Cantata (Kleine Freimaurer-Kantate) entitled Laut verkünde unsre Freude "Laßt uns mit geschlungenen Händen," K. 623a, (For the close of the Lodge)




Masonic Temple Board News

I am proud to announce the electrical project for the Lodge is nearing completion. We have completely new service coming in from the alley to the Temple, new meters servicing all tenants throughout the building and new service wiring and panels for the 9 apartments on the second floor.

A new laundry facility has been added to the second floor for tenants, removing the necessity for laundry rooms in the apartments.

Buss fuses are being replaced with breakers in all electrical boxes on the third and fourth floors and the dimmers in the Red and Blue rooms are being replaced with update dimmer switches. All light bulbs in these two areas will be changed over to LED dimmable to help reduce electrical loads to the lines as well as reduce electrical usage. These are much needed improvements getting completed.

We are currently accepting referrals for 2 or 3 one bedroom apartments on the second floor of the Masonic Temple. Interested parties should contact our Building Manager W.Brother Stephen Steele at (740) 701-1622 for further information.



Painting Restoration

The painting, that can be found hanging in the East behind the Master's station was recently sent off for restoration work by a professional company to help clean the many decades of dust and debris from the canvas. It took several months for the work to be completed as they had to be extremely careful due to the age and gold leaf found to be used in the painting.

The portrait is what we believe to be a one of a kind without knowledge of who the actual artist was that painted it. It measures 4 feet wide by 6 feet tall and is surrounded by a majestic and beautiful gold frame.

The items depicted in the portrait are a representation of but not limited to those items delineated on the Master's Carpet.
